# Home Health Outcomes and Met Quality Measures

**GEORGIA** home health care agencies provide high-quality, critical care to patients in their homes, helping those patients meet their goals and avoid rehospitalizations.

The Medicare home health benefit covers skilled nursing care and therapy services provided to patients in their own residence. The patient must be under the care of a physician-approved place of care, meet the definition of “homebound,” and be in need of skilled services on an intermittent basis. Patients often receive home health care following an acute care hospital discharge or because they require certain

rehabilitation services. Services include care from highly skilled nurses, physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech-language pathologists, and medical social workers. Home health aides provide personal care services for patients if needed to support skilled nursing services.

For an aging population, home health offers the unique ability to provide care in a setting familiar to the patient while improving outcomes and providing excellent care to patients and their families.
